

Try onions from Egypt

It's cheaper but just as good

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BALIK PULAU: Here's an option for that onion ingredient in your cooking.

Try Egyptian onions, which are selling at 98 sen per kilo, since the Indian ones have shot up to RM24 per kilo of late.

"It is the craving for Indian onions that caused the price to spike so much.

"There is no onion shortage," Domestic Trade and Consumer Affairs Minister Datuk Seri Saifuddin Nasution Ismail said.

"There are onions coming from China, Pakistan, Egypt and the Netherlands but people keep looking for just Indian onions," said Saifuddin, who opened TF Value Mart in Botanica.CT yesterday.

TF Value Mart chief executive

officer Ho Mun Hao explained that Indian onions were much sought after because of the moisture in them.

"Other onions are dry," he said, adding that his supermarket chain sold only Egyptian onions because they are similar to the Indian varieties but are much cheaper.

Saifuddin said the National Goods Price Council had sent notices to shops after Indian onions were found to be retailing at RM24 per kilo.

"In the notices, we demanded proof from shops about the original price of the onions from the supplier," he said.

Saifuddin also said the ministry had not received any complaints of hoarding by suppliers, adding that all food products were sufficient for Chinese New Year.
